#### Minutes of Round Table Discussion 28 March 1998

## 98.2 Review of Workshop format

It was generally agreed that the 1998 meeting was too much like a mini-congress with too many brief and hurried lectures, too few possibilities for discussion and too little of the focus and discipline of a workshop. Using some specific proposals from Dierschke and varied comments from the meeting, the following recommendations were accepted for the next Workshop.

- 98.3 The Workshop should have only 1 or 2 themes and these should be more strongly determinative of the focus of the meeting.
- 98.4 A theme should be introduced by a keynote speaker who, in a longer presentation (say, 30 minutes), would develop a frame for the subsequent discussions.
- 98.5 Other papers would be shorter (say, 15-20 minutes) and fewer.
- 98.6 All papers would be followed by opportunity for discussion (say, 10 minutes).
- 98.7 There should be an early announcement of the time, place and theme of the Workshop, with an invitation for papers, at the IAVS meeting in Uppsala and in relevant journals (Action: Rodwell).
- 98.8 Titles and abstracts of offered papers should be submitted by mid-October and a selection made as the basis of the programme (Action: Organising Committee).
- 98.9 The bulk of the programme, already finalised, should be circulated in early December with details of accommodation (Action: Pignatti and Savoia).
- 98.10 The final mailing for Workshop participants should include a more explicit letter of welcome and map of the venue and accommodation for any newcomers to EVS (Action: Rodwell).

- J8.11 All speakers should be provided at this time with firm guidance on the quality of their overheads and the need for any supporting material like tables and diagrams to be provided at the start of the sessions (Action: Organising Committee).
- 98.12 There should be room for smaller presentations (say, 5 minutes) announcing progress in survey programmes, software developments, funding opportunities, and so on.
- 98.13 There should be a poster session, organised, if possible, after lunch one day in one of the greenhouses.
- 98.14 Software demonstrations could be organised as this year for smaller groups in, for example, the Orto Botanico Library.
- 98.15 **1999 Workshop: time, place and theme**It was agreed that, subject to Pignatti's approval and the availability of facilities in Rome, the 1999 Workshop should be at the Orto Botanico from the evening of Thursday 18 March to the morning of Monday 22 March.
- 98.16 A vote was taken on the popularity of various possible themes: bogs and fens, dry grassland, heathland, high mountain vegetation and coastal vegetation. High mountain vegetation was chosen as the 1999 theme, dry grasslands for 2000.
- 98.17 Publication of the 1997 and 1998 Workshop papers and proceedings
  The papers from the 1997 Workshop would be published shortly in Annali di
  Botanica (Action: Pignatti and Savoia).
- 98.18 Various possibilities were discussed for publishing the 1998 Workshop Annali di Botanica, Folia Geobotanica et Phytotaxonomica and an Opulus Press special edition, Journal of Vegetation Science, a new IAVS Proceedings journal together with the general principle of whether to separate papers according to quality, size and subject. It was agreed to ask Pignatti about the possibility of publishing all contributions together in Annali di Botanica (Action: Rodwell).
- 98.19 Status and activities of the European Vegetation Survey
  Although the EVS is a Working Group of the IAVS, its status has never really been formalised. This should be done at the Uppsala meeting when further progress on the IAVS Statutes may be announced (Action: Lawesson and Rodwell).
- 98.20 Schaminée had opened the Workshop with a very useful review of the progress of the EVS and the Organising Committee was asked to draft a third paper for submission to JVS (Action: Schaminée).
- 98.21 It was agreed that the EVS should have a home page related to IAVS. Mucina reported a discussion with Opulus Press who organised the IAVS home page and who were willing to help construct an EVS contribution. A draft would be prepared for discussion at the Uppsala meeting (Action: Eilertsen and Mucina).
- 98.22 It was generally agreed that the EVS was much more than its annual Workshops and that some kind of register of participants' interests and research partnerships would be very valuable as an element of the home page.

# 38.23 Databases and software

There was an enthusiastic consensus that databases and software were now key concerns of the EVS. It was agreed that it would be useful to include such interests in the register (see 98.19) and that a new version of the questionnaire should be prepared and circulated (Action: Eilertsen and Mucina).

- 98.24 Questions of data ownership, standards, formats and database gatekeeping were more complex and needed further discussion.
- 98.25 From time to time, invited experts could give presentations at the annual Workshops on the state of the art in various software fields.
